his informative one-and-a-half-day program is the sixteenth in a series of conferences from the UNC School of Public Health focusing on special health concerns of minorities in North Carolina and the Southeast. This year's conference will focus on traditional and emerging concerns of students and public health and human service professionals. Topic areas to be presented during this conference include:

- Families of Color and Health Care Reform Will President Clinton's Health Security Act and N.C. House Bill 729, known as "Jeralds-Ezell-Fletcher Health Care Reform Act," improve the health status of every North Carolinian and assure access to health care? This conference will enable you to hear from two public health professionals who were part of the formal review process of President Clinton's plan. Also, North Carolina's state health director will provide up-to-date information on the state's health reform initiative, which will be debated by N.C. legislators this spring.
- Minority Youth and Violence A preeminent and preventable health problem of adolescents and young adults is violence, which results in thousands of injuries and homicides each year. African-American males have a rate of death from homicide far greater than that of any other race-sex group—the most dramatic of all health gaps. Experts from North Carolina and Pennsylvania will present their findings on these important issues.
- Minority Youth and Sexuality
 The increase in teenage pregnancies, sexually transmitted diseases, and AIDS in the minority youth population is alarming.
