

# DR. SCHOENBACH, 40, HOSPITAL AIDE, DIES

**Maimonides Official Taught at  
State College of Medicine  
—Expert in Research**

Dr. Emanuel Barnett Schoenbach, Professor of Medicine at the University of the State of New York's College of Medicine and director of medical services at Maimonides Hospital, both in Brooklyn, died of a heart attack early yesterday at his home, 1807 Avenue K, Brooklyn. He was 40 years old.

Dr. Schoenbach, a research expert in bacteriology, immunology and infectious diseases, has published nearly 100 scientific papers in his specialties. He took part two years ago in studies at the Johns Hopkins Medical School that were reported to have resulted in a way to arrest cancer.

The physician was graduated from Harvard College in 1933 and received his medical degree, cum laude, from the Harvard Medical School four years later. After working as a research fellow at Harvard, he became a resident physician at Mount Sinai Hospital here. He returned to Harvard as an instructor in 1941 and 1942.

In the second World War he reached the rank of lieutenant colonel, serving on the War Department's Board for the Investigation of Influenza and the Control of Other Epidemic Diseases. Dr. Schoenbach was also field director of a commission investigating meningitis.

Later he became Assistant Professor of Preventive Medicine at Johns Hopkins University and also served as a medical consultant to the Veterans Administration. He returned to New York, his birthplace, to assume the university and hospital posts last autumn.

Dr. Schoenbach was editor-in-chief of The Quarterly Review of Medicine of the Washington Institute of Medicine and a member of many organizations.

Surviving are his widow, the former Frances Rubens; a daughter, Wendy; two sons, Victor and Andrew; his mother, Mrs. Anna Hackmayer Schoenbach; a sister, Mrs. Bertha Blume, and a brother, Sol Schoenbach, first bassoonist with the Philadelphia Orchestra.
